Dear All,

I've just heard that an old friend died today at the age of 63 after a short illness. We had drifted apart in recent years, so my main emotion was sadness rather than shock at the loss of someone with whom I was still in frequent contact. However, the loss has caused me to think rather deeply about the meaning of Easter.

We are now in April, it will be May by the time you read this, and Easter was at the end of March. Time to move on, you may think. But no: Easter presents everyone, religious or not, with a challenge not to be ignored at any time of year.

If you don't believe in any kind of afterlife, you just have to accept the certainty that at death we and our loved ones simply cease to exist.

My friend, so full of life, humour and good cheer when we last met a couple of years ago (in a much-valued though brief revival of our friendship) is now so much dead and disintegrated matter, nothing more. Perhaps instead you have a general hope that after death *something* of us will live on in some form.

Well, what the message of Easter offers to both these perspectives is the alternative hope of something very much richer and more concrete. The historical evidence that Jesus rose from the dead into an enhanced and glorified form of life is actually quite good, if approached with an open mind. And if this astonishing possibility just might be true, the reason why all this happened was to make it possible for all of us after our own deaths to share in this risen life for eternity in the dimension Christians call heaven.

This possibility should give us hope even in the midst of grief and sadness, and makes the challenging message of Easter relevant all the year round.



Cursillo Weekend Friday, 21st-23rd June

Have you thought you might like to take a weekend to think and explore more about your faith? If so a Cursillo Weekend might be what you are looking for.

The weekend takes place in the Leeds Diocese once a year. This year's dates are from late afternoon on Friday 21st June until Sunday 23rd June, to be held at Wydale Hall near Scarborough, (no need to worry about the cost).

Cursillo is "A movement of the church which provides a method by which Christians are empowered to grow through prayer, study and action and to share Gods love with everyone".

You probably will not have heard the word Cursillo, but it's a Spanish word meaning a short course and it is used to describe a Christian Movement that started in Spain after the war, but now has spread internationally, including to this country, and is known here as The British Anglican Cursillo.

With the encouragement of both Archbishops, Cursillo forms part of the life of many dioceses, as here in Leeds. Bishop Nick has appointed the Reverend Dr Sally Osborn, who along with a team from different parishes, runs it. The membership, in excess of 300, is made up of both clergy and lay people who found the course and the continuing support a much-valued means to sustain and grow their faith, in both their private life and their commitment to their own parish.



Kirkby Malzeard C of E Primary School

The start of the summer term saw the beginning of a new science unit featuring plants. Pupils will be looking at how plants can provide our food, flavour our dishes by adding herbs, provide habits for wildlife and how they enhance our beautiful surroundings in our gardens, fields and parks.

Emma from Love Science visited the school in the second week to do a workshop with KS2 children. They investigated how using UV paint can discover the power of the sun and used the tricks that light play on our brain to create optical illusions and also discovered how light splits to create rainbows. In the practical activity the children were able to make their own torches using white light and experimented with mixing colour.

In the very last week before Easter, Years 3-6 had a fabulous time on their residential visit to Bewerley Park. They enjoyed lots of outdoor activities that included rock climbing, canoeing, gorge scrambling and river walking as well as taking part in a night time walk.

During the first week of the term Acorn and Oak classes visited Richmond Castle as part of their history topic and enjoyed learning about the design of a castle and how important they were to the country a very long time ago. There are several community activities planned, the first of which is the Community lunch at the Mechanics Institute when homemade soup and bread will be served that KS2 have been busy preparing in their cooking sessions. The children have volunteered to come and help serve and talk to the members of the lunch club community.

This term the popular gardening club is running again, organised by Pippa, and Shine club are meeting to plan for our whole school Collective Worship time, when we celebrate our values of love, kindness, patience and peace: all faiths and those with non are welcome.

Nature notes from Mickley

Despite all the continuing rain, spring is definitely springing.....somewhat early.

A robin decided to nest in the ground near a field gate, 5 tiny eggs and one terrified parent when I found it. A blackbird is sitting in their nest under the roof of a shelter at the back of our garage oblivious to our fiddling about. The

song thrush is in overdrive singing at full volume from the top of the apple tree, from dawn to late dusk...when does it eat?

Curlews in glorious song sail overhead, as do skeins of greylag geese, oystercatchers crying to each other. The birds are on the move....

The large amount of frogspawn in the pond seems to have vanished, I fished about 60 snails from where it was. At night there were at least 20 newts in the same place, so has the spawn been recycled? The hares are everywhere in groups of 2 to 5, occasionally boxing alone or with another...wonder why? Will a very large buck hare get mistaken for a small deer, it is so large!

Hazel trees are coppiced and await conversion into hurdles and poles for the peas and beans. Ladybirds emerge as we coppice, some native, some the Asian lady bird, the Harlequin, now expanding across the UK. Brimstone, Peacock and Tortoiseshell butterflies emerge from winter's slumbers and flutter through the garden or rest in the moments of sun to warm up!

Primroses glow in the dusk light, cascading everywhere, daffodils have grown in yellow profusion alongside roads and gardens, dandelions spring up everywhere (much to my disgust!). The emerging brassica seedlings need defending against slugs (what already??) and the tomato plants are rocketing. The vegetable clock has started.

And still the rain falls, someone said it is the wettest winter since 1872, all I know is that the fields are bogs. Sadly, the robin eggs are eaten so I hope the parents rebuild in a hedge! Still the birds are making north and the black cap from Africa took a flight stop on the hedge and maybe it knows the drier times are ahead.

Pheasants! Bah! What are they good for? The varmints have willfully and secretly snapped off nearly all the heads of our beautiful snakeshead fritillaries growing in our water meadow (sorry I mean lawn) and I have had to erect a chicken wire security fence to protect the brave remaining few.

Congratulations to Mickley, your frogs were at it much earlier than ours who only produced frogspawn in the middle of March and I can't see any in the Sawley Wildlife Garden Pond at the moment.


